Speaker: Rtn. James “Dusty” Miller, Rutland Rotary Club
Rotary Club Meeting – 13 April 2026

Rtn. James “Dusty” Miller delivered a compelling and well-researched presentation on the vital role played by women in the Special Operations Executive (SOE) during the Second World War.

Dusty explained that his interest in the subject was shaped by his family background. His father, Jock, worked on RAF bases across Lincolnshire, including RAF Waddington, while his mother served in the Women’s Auxiliary Air Force (WAAF). After retiring, Dusty completed an Open University degree, focusing his research on the SOE, which was established by Winston Churchill in July 1940.

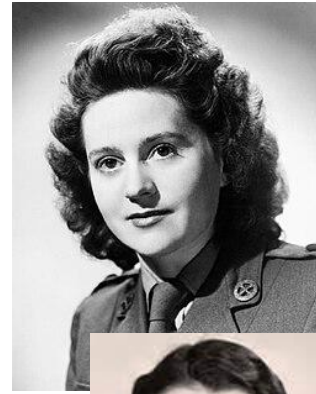
Originally tasked with sabotage and “causing havoc” behind enemy lines, particularly in occupied France, the SOE soon evolved into a highly secretive intelligence organisation. Brutal German reprisals against civilians led to greater emphasis on covert intelligence gathering. Officially, the organisation was known as the Inter-Services Bureau.

SOE agents generally worked in three-person teams: an organiser, a courier and a wireless operator. Of the approximately 470 agents, only 39 were women. Buster highlighted that women proved especially effective as couriers, often able to move through occupied territories with less suspicion.

Initially, many senior military figures opposed the recruitment of women for operational roles, objecting to their undergoing the same intense training as men — including firearms, explosives and hand-to-hand combat — effectively becoming “licensed to kill,” a phrase believed to have been coined by Ian Fleming.

Dusty focused on the stories of three remarkable women:

Odette Hallowes (later Odette Sansom) served as a courier in France. Captured and brutally interrogated, she never betrayed her colleagues. She survived imprisonment and became the first woman awarded the George Cross, also receiving the Légion d'Honneur. Her story inspired books and the film *Carve Her Name With Pride*.



Violette Szabo, a wireless operator, undertook highly dangerous missions before being captured, tortured and executed in 1945. Her bravery and sacrifice have made her one of the SOE's most revered figures.



Vera Atkins, though not a field agent, played a crucial role in recruiting, training and managing agents. After the war, she worked tirelessly to uncover the fate of missing operatives. She is widely believed to have inspired the character Miss Money Penny in the James Bond novels.



Dusty also paid tribute to the courageous Lysander pilots who flew agents in and out of occupied France without navigators, many receiving gallantry awards.

The talk offered a powerful insight into an often under-recognised chapter of wartime history and was warmly received by members.

John Cawdell gave a vote of thanks on behalf of Lincoln Rotary Club for an interesting and informative talk, acknowledging the bravery of the airmen and SOE ladies.

Lincoln Rotary Meeting – 20 April 2026

Speaker: Steve Holt – “The Lincoln Poacher”, Lincoln City FC Mascott

Talk titled: "Poacher's Mascot Mayhem"

Steve served as Chairman of Peterborough United in the mid-2000s and as Managing Director at Aon Risk Solutions. Alongside his corporate career, he has been deeply involved in the voluntary sector, including roles with Wooden Spoon, Sport Relief, MAGPAS Air Ambulance, and community and educational organisations such as the Cambridge Science Centre.



Steve, better known locally as The Poacher mascot of Lincoln City Football Club, explored the unexpected history, psychology and cultural impact of football mascots, blending local tradition, football folklore and a wealth of entertaining anecdotes. He began by explaining that the true purpose of a mascot is to create an emotional connection with supporters. Even on cold, wet days or when the home team is losing heavily, a mascot can still lift spirits. Mascots exist to encourage, energise and entertain, remaining constantly in motion to engage fans of all ages.

The Poacher at Lincoln City draws strongly on local heritage. The name comes from the traditional Lincolnshire folk song, while the Imp design is inspired by the famous Lincoln Cathedral carving, a symbol of the city. Lincoln first adopted an Imp mascot in 1921, having previously been associated with a black cat. At one time, supporters even placed a wooden imp on the centre circle before matches to entertain younger fans. Today, mascots play an important role in marketing, merchandise and youth engagement.

Steve then traced the broader history of football mascots, noting that mascots as symbols of good fortune date back to French opera. World Cup Willie, mascot of the 1966 World Cup, helped popularise mascots worldwide. Early football mascots were often real animals, such as Manchester United’s assorted menagerie, before costume mascots became widespread with the rise of television entertainment.

The audience particularly enjoyed Steve’s stories of famous and infamous mascot moments, including Cyril the Swan of Swansea City famously fighting Zampa the Lion of Millwall, and the Deepdale Duck of Preston North End becoming the first mascot ever sent off during a match. Other highlights included the Burnley Bee humorously booking the referee’s eyesight by handing over a pair of spectacles, and Hanguus the Monkey of Hartlepool United, who later achieved notoriety by being elected Mayor.



Steve concluded with a behind-the-scenes look at life inside the Poacher suit: extreme heat, poor visibility, frequent falls and relentless banter from away fans. Matchdays involve constant movement around the stadium, fan zones and community areas, and at the highest level mascotting can even be a full-time profession. Packed with sharp one-liners and infectious enthusiasm, the talk was warmly received **A vote of thanks was given by Rotarian Dennis B**
